### Gospel Reflection - Job Vacancy

It is at this time of year, when the Christmas holiday is well and truly over and it's time to go Back to work, that we wonder what we are really doing with our lives. When we meet the first disciples in today's gospel, they are wondering pretty much the same thing. Were they going to spend out the rest of their lives catching fish, or were they going to follow Jesus and become 'fishers of men'? The early disciples were unerring in their discipleship. They left their nets and followed Jesus 'at once' .... 'immediately'. There was no doubt in their minds about how they wanted to live out their lives. Discipleship was a job for life.



Jesus' work is never done and there will always be vacancies for new disciples. Discipleship is something akin to an army. Without active supporters, a cause can grow faint. We are not asked to keep Christ's teaching to ourselves, we are asked to be 'fishers of men' always opening up God's opportunities to others. The world is a dangerous place full of greed and extremism. There are too many people in the world who feel that money and coercion are the way to get what they want. There are not enough people who believe that love and respect for every human being they meet might be a better answer.

We might feel uncomfortable with the idea of being 'fishers of men'. It conjures the idea of notching up conversions like some kind of biblical sales person. Today we are asked to sweep our preconceptions aside. Being a 'fisher of men' needs to be about making a real difference in other people's lives by demonstrating our discipleship. Discipleship is a job for life.

#### Saints for the Week

**26 January : Memorial of Saints Timothy and Titus, Bishops.** Timothy and Titus were disciples and helpers of the apostle Paul (the former being placed in charge of the Church at Ephesus, the latter the Church at Crete. St Paul wrote his pastoral epistles to them, containing much useful advice for the instruction of the clergy and people.

**27 January : St Angela Merici, Virgin. (1474-1540).**

Angela took the habit of the Third Order of St Francis and gathered together girls whom she formed in the works of charity. In 1535 she formed at Brescia, the religious institute of the Ursulines (a society of women with the task of teaching poor girls to be good Christianas.

**28 January : Memorial of Saint Thomas Aquinas. Priest and Doctor of the Church. (c1225-1274).** A member of a noble family of Aquino, Thomas was one of the most influential of Christian theologians and philosophers. He studied first at Monte Cassino and then at Naples; later as a member of the Dominican Order, he completed his studies at Paris and then Cologne with St Albert the Great as his teacher, developing his profound synthesis of faith and reason. Besides his commentaries on scripture and the philosophy of Aristotle, his 60-volume Summa Theologica, though unfinished, is a compendium of Catholic doctrine. He also wrote the eucharistic hymns Panis Angelicus, O Salutaris and Pange Lingua. Thomas died at Fossanuova on 17 March 1274 and was reburied at Toulouse on 28 January 1369.

**31 January : Saint John Bosco, Priest. (1815-1888).** Born near Castelnuovo in the diocese of Turin, he had a difficult childhood in poverty but was eventually ordained priest. He put every effort into the education of youth and founded religious congregations which spread globally to teach them and bring them up in the Christian way of life. He also wrote some short works in defence of the faith.

**Canon Christopher reflects ....** We often see in the scriptures events that show God conveying messages to people through dreams. For example, God guided Saint Joseph in what he should do to take Mary as his wife and in protecting Jesus and herself when they were in danger. There are times perhaps when we wish God would guide us more clearly to help us to solve problems or make decisions. He does guide us but in many different ways.

Recently, I have suffered from occasional nightmares that at times can be quite distressing. It usually results in my getting out of bed and completing my night's sleep in a comfortable chair. When I was at university one of the courses I followed in Experimental Psychology consisted in a series of lectures on sleep and its effect on our lives. I can't remember much of the detail after more than fifty years but recently I did a bit of investigation to find possible causes. When I studied the small print in my medication, I found that nightmares can be one of the side-effects, but they can also be caused by something we may have consumed in the hours leading up to sleep. Consequently, I try to avoid the cause and effect.

Some of the causes of such dreams are based on recent events or conversations I have had and I usually remember something I have said, heard or done leading up to this time. Nightmares are related also to stress, anxiety and distress that are very much part of life. Even though people will often say "take it easy and rest", that is not always possible. However, the best solution is reflection and prayer, and I always find that works.

As Jesus was human, there were times when he was stressed and anxious, when he would go away to pray alone to his Father in heaven. On the night before he suffered the passion and crucifixion, when he was in the Garden of Gethsemane, so great was his stress that he sweated blood

On this Sunday of the Word of God we can look especially at the words of Our Lord that are so consoling ... *"Come to me all you who labour and are overburdened and I will give you rest. Shoulder my yolk and learn from me for I am gentle and humble in heart, and you will find rest for your souls"*. Fortunately, I have the privilege, of being able to visit Him in the Blessed Sacrament at any moment of the day when I need Him and so I go into the church to speak to Him in prayer.

I share a verse from one of the night prayer hymns in the Prayer of the Church ....

*When in the night I sleepless lie, my soul with heavenly thoughts supply,  
Let no ill dreams disturb my rest, no powers of darkness me molest. Amen*

#### Reflection on the Conversion of St Paul

St Paul has but one weapon ...the  
message of Christ and the gift of his entire  
life for Christ and for others. It is precisely  
this readiness to lay himself open,  
personally, to be consumed for the sake of  
the Gospel, to make himself all things to  
all people, unstintingly, that gives him  
credibility and builds up the Church.

Jesus calls his disciples and he also calls us to follow him.  
Jesus describes how his followers who share his power with others must live.  
They are to go forth two by two and live as workers bringing in the harvest that  
is given by God (which they did not necessarily sow).

- They are to live with courage, but as lambs among wolves, non-violently,  
protectively, keeping the flock together, without scandals and without reliance  
on a purse (money) or more than what they need for the moment.
- They are to bring peace and share what is given to them, not looking for a  
better deal with others.
- They are to heal (bring medicines and healthcare, hope, dignity and a sense  
of life for the further and preach God's kingdom of just and peace so near to  
us).

These are the roles and ways of bishops along the Way of the Lord.
